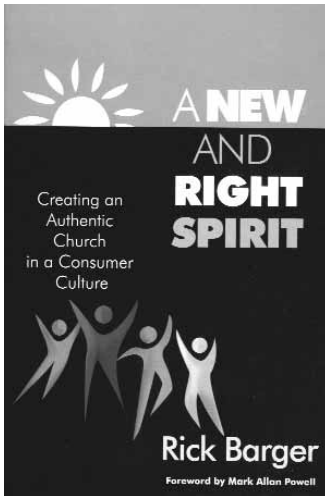

Rick Barger is lead pastor at Abiding Hope Lutheran Church in Littleton, Colorado, which is one of the largest and fastest-growing congregations in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. He is also the founder of Abiding Hope's Transformational Leadership Academy.

The Session and Board of Deacons at First Church have been studying *A New and Right Spirit: Creating an Authentic Church in a Consumer Culture*, Barger's book that argues passionately for congregations to reexamine what it means to be an "authentic church" in a culture where authenticity is hard to come by.

"The central thesis of this book – the relationship between authenticity to the church's primal story and true transformation – is not just a theory, nor is it nostalgia or a fascination with a long-ago church in a long-ago and foreign culture. Rather, it is a hope-filled proposition, grounded in the reality of the existence of vital congregations that provide substance for the renewal of the church in North America. They exist as wonderful challenges to the notion that the North American church, especially its mainline expressions, has seen its best days. They suggest that this post-modern, post-Christendom, and secular age in which we are living actually could be one of the most exciting times to be the church.

"The story that grounds the church is not that we are particularly good, have undertaken some nice projects, or achieved some protection against bad happening to us. The church bears witness not to the choices we make but to the choice that God has made and continues to make. The story that grounds the church is that God is good and is a God who comes back and keeps coming back to a world that rejects him. The biblical witness is that the world crucifies Jesus and his disciples desert him, and yet the risen Jesus comes back to meet them on the road to Emmaus, opening again the scriptures to them and breaking bread in their midst (Luke 24: 13-35). He orders the first apostles to announce to the ends of the earth the "forgiveness of sins" (Luke 24: 47)."

Simply stated, vital congregations are congregations that are alive. They get their life not from their latest strategies but from their stubborn refusal to play on Astroturf. They are solidly anchored and get their life from the rich soil of the church's ancient and authentic story. These vital congregations exist in virtually every setting, come in all sizes, and do not belong to just one way of being church."

Dear Friends,

We are well into the season of Lent ... and in the meantime, life's busy pace keeps swirling around us. Sustaining sacred time in the midst of our complex schedules is no easy feat. But it's our very busy-ness that makes our moments of God-centeredness so much more precious, and so much more necessary.

Like a coach in mid-season, let me offer some practical suggestions for keeping up our spiritual energy through Easter. Choose one or more:

1. Spend 2 hours in one (or more) of our mini-retreats for Lent. User-friendly, easy to fit into a hectic schedule, no preparation, great for re-energizing.
2. Add Wednesday morning services to your weekly pattern. 7:00 – 7:30 a.m. in the Chapel, a brief reflection by a church member plus communion. Often moving, always sustaining. A great habit. Stay for fellowship over continental breakfast in the Parlor if you have time.
3. If you haven't chosen a Lenten discipline yet (see my last *Faith Connections* letter), pick one now. If you have, recommit yourself to it.
4. Commit some time to the visit by Rick Barger. Open your eyes to a new way to see the church.



None of these is a magic bullet. But "Lenten disciplines" are called disciplines for a reason; like any strength-training, spiritual development takes effort and commitment. But I know that you can go the distance ... because Christ is in it with us.

WHO ARE WE?

Our Christian calling takes many forms. Here is one example

with personal thoughts from **Dick Mentzinger** regarding his experience as a member of the Long Range Planning Council (LRPC):



Being in a group of sensitive, committed, intelligent people of faith with a dedication to working out difficult questions has been a joy and a revelation. The process has been long and probing and adventuresome, because we have, together, talked and thought through deep and perplexing areas of our faith, trying to develop a path that has relevancy and meaning for the long term direction of our church. Never easy, but so rewarding, and never with rancor or ill feeling, but rather with the caring and concern for each other that marks the Christian experience, it has been illuminating and real.

I learned that when you put good people together who have mutual respect for each other and who really want to achieve a cogent and spiritual goal there is so much you can do to move forward in your faith experience. This all requires hard work, because thinking is hard, but the results can make all the labor and effort worthwhile. If we can extend our experience, and our joy in it, to others so that they believe in and support the core mission of our church we will be overjoyed. We are all prepared to participate in the ongoing task of making it happen.

Having a plan that has at its core the spiritual direction of the church is a huge plus. Knowing who you are and asking what God wants you to do as the underpinning of your plan makes it so much more possible to make good decisions that are faith oriented. It allows you to make worship and education and mission decisions, for example, that are seated in your faith experience and carry forward the essence of what it is to be a Christian. The pragmatic plans are real and important, but they must be grounded in your Christian faith. With informed and dedicated leadership in our clergy and staff, and a congregation poised to move ahead we can grow and develop as an instrument of God.

My surprise is in how very much I have enjoyed the work that we have been doing, the openness, the give-and-take, the personal revelation, the desire to do good, the cooperation and the deep sincerity of all of our members. I would hope that as we move ahead so many others would have similar feelings and know that God is touching us in some special way.

We have to learn that the faith journey is just that - a journey. We have to relate to each other, sharing our joys and our concerns, faithful in the fact that we are all in this together, part of the family of faith. We have to understand what the Great Ends of the church are, what they mean to each of us and how they can be translated into the transforming experience that will make a difference in our lives and those of others. We have to learn once more that this is an imperfect world and we are imperfect, so that all we have done so far will be improved and made better by those that follow, and with God's help we will have a church where our core mission - proclaiming the gospel, providing a community of spiritual nurture and promoting a vision of God's justice - will be at the center of our lives.

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING

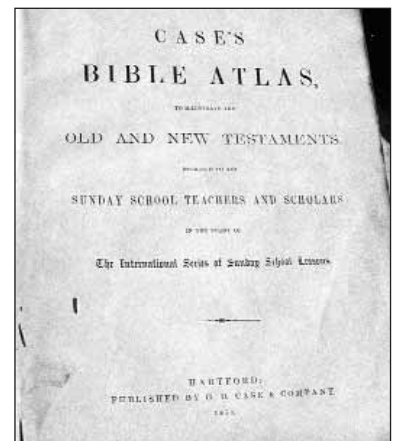

The book *Case's Bible Atlas*, published in 1878, was discovered recently in the church steeple between the rafters. It was spotted by Don Spooner who saw something in the rays of sunlight shining through a crack on the book.

The Atlas was published "...to illustrate the Old and New Testaments designed to aid Sunday school teachers and scholars in the study of The International Series of Sunday School Lessons."

The volume, now in History and Archives, contains many maps of the countries in the Middle East.

At the time, First Church sponsored missionaries in the Middle East. The book belonged to Sanford Hardy who may have been a student at Lake Forest Academy or Lake Forest College. His name is not listed in the census records for 1880.


